
Some Lessons Aren't Taught In Class



Homecoming. Just that one word brings back positive memories and high spirits for anyone who has experienced it. Very few other events can bring a school together to work together and celebrate as effectively.





Impressions of the Old KE Last




Although the yellow halls of the third floor bring back memories of the old KE, the new atmosphere is starting to take over the old.

Foreign Students Offer New Perspectives on American Life


The Spectrum had the opportunity to talk to German student Thomas Dörsing, who stayed with KE student Angela Gorney in the October

'Getting on the plane in Germany I felt very excited to be going to America. My group is very lucky because it will be a very good experience. I was also very happy to be flying because it was my first plane


'Toronto is a very big city. In Germany, we don't have such big cities. but I don't think I would like to live in a city that size, it is too big.




















Driving Anxiety



Who can forget the cold and the rain. Eventually the weather did not phase us due to our very "happy" state.




















Junior Spirit

The most noticeable change is the delay in admitting juniors. The group decided to move the induction ceremony from November to March this year in hopes that a smaller group would be more manageable and more active.


Another change this year involves the community service that all NHS members must complete. The two service project requirements has now been changed to ten hours in an effort to balance out the work done by each member.

So what lasting impressions have athletics made on you? Well, you could say that sports have given excitement to what could have been a boring high school career and has helped you create a better future.





Shoots Their Way to Victory





















Indoor Track

Tries for A Touchdown



















Wrestling



Much credit should also be given to the JV teams, both of which had successful seasons. Next year's teams should prove to be a powerful threat to their competitors.
















Get Involved






Varsity Hockey


















Going Home
