- Studying a World Language will expand your world.

French/le Français



- French is the 11th most widely spoken language in the world!
- 200 million people around the world understand, speak, read or write French.
- New York State shares a border with Quebec, which is one of our largest trading partners!
- France is one of the largest nations in the European Union.



French



- More than a third of all English words are derived directly or indirectly from French, and it's estimated that English speakers who have never studied French already know 15,000 French words!
- What does it sound like? Here's a sample:

Bonjour, je m'appelle Sylvain et j'habite à Montréal! Hello, my name is Sylvain and I live in Montreal!



German/Deutsch

- Over 100 million people in the world speak German, with over 5 million in the U.S.!
- Germany's economy ranks #4 in the world.
- It is known for fast cars, modern engineering, hightech industry and, of course, soccer! You may know that Germany won the World Cup for the 4th time in 2014.
- 1 in 6 Western New Yorkers in Erie county claim German heritage. Do you have German ancestors?



German



- Since English and German come from the same language family, English speakers will find many words (26%!) very familiar!
- What does it sound like? Here's a sample:

Hallo, ich bin Nikolas! Ich wohne in Berlin und ich spiele gern Fußball!

Hi, my name is Nick – I live in Berlin and like to play soccer!

Spanish/Español



- With over 329 million native speakers, Spanish is the second most widely spoken language in the world.
 (Chinese is first and English is third.)
- Spanish is the second most spoken language in the U.S. with over 50 million speakers.
- Many businesses in all areas of the U.S. depend on a bilingual workforce to communicate with their clients.
- Most of south and central America is Spanish-speaking
 and many American companies do business there!



Spanish/Español



- Many words in Spanish will already seem familiar to English speakers, since Spanish, like French is a Romance language – meaning it developed from ancient Latin.
- Since many U.S. Americans grow up hearing Spanish around them, it probably won't sound very strange to you! Here's a sample:

¡Hola! Me llamo Rafael y me gusta jugar al tenis! Hi! My name is Rafael and I like to play tennis!

Choose carefully – you'll stay in the land

 Choose carefully – you'll stay in the language you choose for at least two years – and maybe up to six!

• If you find that you LOVE learning languages, you might be able to add a second foreign language in high school!



Think about it!



- In New York State, all students are required to take and successfully complete two years of a foreign language and take and pass the final exam at the end of 8th grade – to earn one high school credit.
- 7th and 8th grade are your required two years, so make the most of them – we're sure you'll want to continue in high school too!
